The List of the Dead

The names and details which follow are those of people who have died trying to obtain sanctuary in Europe or the UK. We read them so as to honour their lives and mourn the injustice of their deaths. Many are unknown, but as Pope Francis said, 'Every one has a name, a face and a story'. Today we mark those who died in March 2023.

After each entry, *Leader* says: Lord have mercy. *All* respond: **Christ, have mercy.**

10	12/3	An Afghan man of 23 died of unknown causes, his body found by activists lying

		Belarusian border.

11	12/3	34 people, including 3 children, drowned when an overloaded boat sank off Ambanja, Madagascar on the way to the French island of Mayotte; 23 survived.
12	12/3	Abdo al Sabbah, 17, and Abdel Razzak al Qastal, 18, both from Syria, were tortured to death by Turkish border guards when trying to cross the Syrian-Turkish border near Reyhanli. They were beaten with various tools and forced to
		drink petrol. 7 other men were severely injured.
13	12/3	30 people drowned when a boat on the way from Benghazi, Libya to Italy capsized. Italian authorities were aware of the distress call for at least 9 hours but took no action. 17 were rescued by a merchant vessel.
14	13/3	An Afghan man was shot in a fight between Afghan migrants near the makeshift border camp in a disused Viskozine factory in Loznica, Serbia.
15	14/3	4 people drowned when 2 boats sank off Kusadasi, Turkey after an alleged pushback by Greek authorities; 38 survived.
16	15/3	The bodies of 5 people, including 1 woman, 2 men, a girl aged 3 and a boy of 7 or 8 were found floating in the sea 17 days after a boat crashed off Cutro, Italy, killing 80.
17	19/3	1 Afghan man died when a car overturned in a ravine evading a police check in the Dragoman region, Bulgaria, near the Serbian border; 10 were injured.
18	20/3	17 people, including a mother with her 3 children, drowned when a boat on the way to Sardinia, Italy sank off Skikda, Algeria. 9 bodies found, 2 survived.
19	21/3	30 people drowned when a boat capsized off Al Argoub, Western Sahara on the way to the Canary Islands; 12 bodies found, 9 survived.
20	21/3	The body of an Afghan man aged 27 was found near Zamosze, Poland near the Belarusian border by national park employees. His uncle, who had travelled with him, had urged a rescue operation to be undertaken for a month; Polish authorities blocked search attempts by activists.
21	21/3	The body of a victim of the crash off Cutro was found on the beach of Praialonga, Italy, after 23 days.
22	23/3	Sisters Saran-soumah, 12, and Macire, 10, drowned before the eyes of their mother when a boat overturned off the Tunisian coast on the way to Italy. 36 survived.
23	23/3	33 people from Ivory Coast and sub-Saharan Africa, including 5 children and 2 men, drowned when an overloaded boat sank off La Louza, Tunisia on way to Lampedusa; 9 bodies were found, 5 survived.
24	24/3	16 people, including 1 child and 2 women, drowned in the Alboran Sea on way from Cherchell, Algeria to Cartagena, Spain; 2 bodies found.
25	24/3	A person was found dead of unknown causes by activists in Białowieża National Park near Hwoźna River at the Poland-Belarus border.
26	24/3	42 people from Africa drowned when their boat capsized off Sfax after Tunisian coast guards removed its engine. Some of the men were beaten. 4 survived.
27	24/3	A man of about 40 died of unknown causes near Sofikos, Greece, near the Turkish border.
28	25/3	4 people, a woman and 3 men, drowned when a boat on the way from Tunisia to Italy capsized near Malta; 51 survived.
29	26/3	2 people from sub-Saharan Africa drowned when a boat sank of Sfax, Tunisia on the way to Italy, their bodies recovered by trawlers.
30	26/3	10 people from sub-Saharan Africa drowned when a boat capsized off Mahdia, Tunisia on the way to Italy; 11 survived.
31	26/3	19 people from sub-Saharan Africa drowned when a boat capsized off Tunisia on the way to Italy; 5 survived.

32	28/3	A young man from Sabikhan, Syria was shot by Turkish border guards near Ras Al-Ain, Syria while trying to cross the border to Turkey.
33	28/3	A woman's body was found among rocks on Lampedusa, presumed to be a victim of the shipwrecks near Malta.
34	29/3	A woman's body was found floating off Punta Alaimo, Lampedusa.

Reading

(John 8:1-11) Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. Early in the morning he came again to the temple. All the people came to him and he sat down and began to teach them. The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery; and making her stand before all of them, they said to him, 'Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. Now in the law Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?' They said this to test him, so that they might have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground. When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, 'Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.' And once again he bent down and wrote on the ground. When they heard it, they went away, one by one, beginning with the elders; and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him. Jesus straightened up and said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' She said, 'No one, sir.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again.'

Reflection

Prayers of Intercession

Everyone present reads in turn. All say the **response** in bold.

We pray for the thousands of men, women and children, known and unknown, who set out to seek safety and a better life in Europe, but who were drowned in the Mediterranean, the Atlantic, the Aegean Sea, or the English Channel, and for those who mourn them. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you**.

We pray for migrants who have met hostility or violence from authorities or vigilantes. We pray for those pushed back into the sea, and those forced into the desert. O Lord hear our prayer, and let our cry come unto you.

We pray for all those seeking sanctuary in the UK who depend on its adhering to the European Convention for Human Rights, and pray that our government will respect the agreement that we helped to draw up over 70 years ago. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you**.

We pray for the former residents of the camp in Calais and for those who remain there. We pray for the protection of all people in refugee camps and the communities they build. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you**.

We pray for refugees arriving in the UK and being placed in detention in poor conditions at arrival, and those made homeless on being granted asylum. We pray for their mental and physical well-being and for the recognition of their right to decent housing. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you**.

We pray for a resolution to the conflicts and oppression which are forcing so many to flee in desperation, for the end of the arms trade, and the realisation of the right of people to remain in their homes. We pray for the people of Iran, Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria, Eritrea, Sudan, Ukraine, and Palestine. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you.**

We pray for those who are fleeing the effects of climate change, with rising sea levels, drought, flood or crop failure, yet who have caused little or no damage to our climate; for those who make decisions about compensation, and those who continue to exploit the earth for profit. We ask forgiveness for our complicity in this. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you**.

We pray for the safety and success of those serving aboard the rescue ships: the *Sea Watch 3*, the *Life Support*, the *Aurora*, the *Imara*, the *Rise Above*, the *Nadir*, the *Geo Barents*, the *Wind Express*, the *Ocean Viking*, the *Open Arms*, the *Aita Mari*, the *Trotamar III*, and others; and of the volunteers of the Alarm Phone, and the reception teams on the Greek and Italian islands. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you**.

We pray that you inspire compassion in all those who work with migrants on behalf of governments, and that they recognise all those they come across as their brothers and sisters. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you.**

We pray that you create in all of us the strength and resilience to resist unjust immigration laws and to support one another in this struggle. O Lord hear our prayer, **and let our cry come unto you**.

Leader invites those present to add other prayers if they wish.
